

Trout in the Classroom, Fall 2009

Have you considered volunteering for Trout in the Classroom? Or have you participated, maybe helping with casting, but you'd like to know more about teaching the water quality station? At November's meeting, everyone will have a chance to learn more about TIC.

This program of the Department of Fish & Game and sponsored by the Kaweah Flyfishers in our area (so long guided by our own Mickey Powell) introduces students, fourth through eighth grades, to the basics of the trout's existence and the craft of the fly fisherman. This year George Pilling is putting together a book bag that will be loaned out to each class and will include the classic DVD, "The Way of a Trout," a DVD of Don Lieb teaching fly tying, videos by "Bill Nye, The Science Guy" discussing wetlands, and several good books related to the topic. Teachers attend a workshop put on by the DFG before setting up their program. Once they have reviewed the program, they can go back to their classrooms and use the material and add to it, as they like. All classrooms set up an aquarium with a chiller to establish the appropriate environment for raising trout eggs. The club orders the eggs and sees that they are delivered to each class. While the students are tending the fish, the teachers invite our KFF volunteers to come to the classroom to give demonstrations on fly tying and an overview of the life cycle of the insects trout feed on.



Then the magic day comes when the fish are matured enough to be released into a DFG-approved waterway, such as the North Fork of the Tule at River Ridge Ranch, or the Kings River at Cricket Hollow in Reedley or Choinumni Park, or the Kaweah River near Three Rivers. Whenever possible, the teacher procures a bus and delivers the students and fish to the designated site where our volunteers will guide them through instructions on entomology or water quality or soils and sediments. The students also get a chance to hold a fly rod and learn some basic casting. To burn off that last bit of energy they may be harboring, they play a game called "Hooks and Ladders." The students, playing all the parts, risk damage in fish ladders simulated by a jump rope, being caught by a bear or eagle or fisherman while negotiating a journey up a "river." The effect is chaos and fun.



In the past our good-natured volunteers have arrived at the release site, knowing they would be provided with materials for a station and students – little else. Most of the volunteers vie for the casting station, thinking they have some experience with a fly rod if not teaching young people. They wait with anticipation until the doors of the buses open and our eager young naturalists pile out, racing directly at them. These people deserve purple hearts! What they get is evidently much more valuable, because I see them return year after year.

On November 6th, we will be dedicating our meeting time to making our members more familiar with TIC and teaching the participants how to run each of the stations. If you're a beginning fly fisher, this is perfect for answering your questions; you can pose as a fourth-grader and no one will be the wiser. If you're an experienced volunteer, your tricks can be shared with everyone. We should all glean some great tips and provide confidence to some new volunteers. If you want to be a part of the list of volunteers, be sure to let me know.

Here is a short list of what you will find at the sale on September 19th:

1. Numerous custom dubbing blends made by Clarence along with many, many more bags of natural and synthetic dubbings including every color of Fly-Rite you can imagine.
2. Several fly tying vises and all manner of tying tools, Waste-Troll, Electric blender (for dubbing blends), original Buz's Head Cement.

GREEN RIVER FISHING EXCURSION, UTAH

July 11th through the 19th twelve intrepid KFF members and friends ventured 1145 miles (one way) to fish the well known trout fishery, the Green River below the Flaming Gorge Dam which is near the town of Duch John.

We camped at the Fire Fighters Memorial campground, which was arranged by Bill Thiesen, thanks Bill, that overlooked a section of the reservoir. The camp ground was named after and dedicated to fire fighters who lost their life fighting a huge forest fire in this section of Utah.

The Green River is divided into three sections, "A", "B", and "C" and each one has their own unique qualities for fishing and drifting. All of us had a guide, some for one day and some for four days, thanks to David Harris who did a great job of making the reservations and guide arrangements. Fishing on the river with the guides in drift boats was a great way to fish. Fred Naylor and Rick Hartley who took a one day drift in Fred's inflatable kayak; they also claim that they went through the rapids of the "B" section, hmmm.



Each day brought new reports of many big fish (17" - 22"), brown, rainbow and cutbow trout caught from either the drift boats or from wading the river. The river guides were very knowledgeable and knew where the fish were which I am sure accounted for our high fish in the net count.

The chow was prepared by head chefs Jim Brem and Mark Cave with the help of the cooking crews, everyone was divided into two groups and alternated every other day on the kitchen chores. This way it not only made it easier on everyone but no one complained about the food; except for the amount, some said they gained five pounds on the trip.



The only glitch in the trip was when Jim Brem's Ford F-250 decided that it wanted to stay in Vegas for an extra day because the EGR cooler leaking coolant into the engine and blowing white smoke out the tail pipe. I am sure that is not what Jim intended at all. Anyway he had to rent a car packed what he could and headed home, then he had to go back to Vegas to pick up the truck when it was fixed. Fred Sciacea and Bill Winn were very happy when their luggage and gear finally rolled back into town; so was Bill's grandson Conner who needed his backpack for another outing.





The 6 pounder spit out the 8"er and waved good by on its way to his home and Bill being the gentleman fly fisherman that he is, I am sure every word he said said nothing worse than "oh darn and oh shoot"; the 8" was released unharmed after a successful netting. 

Next year????? who knows.







Peacock High Visibility Ant

Steps tied by Don Lieb

This little black ant pattern was developed for the small streams in the Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks. It is very effective during the black ant hatches in May and June.

Materials

Hook: Daiichi 1180 or equivalent
Thread: Black 6/0
Post: Green Glo Bug or polypropylene
Tail: Red hackle barbs
Rib: Small brass wire
Thorax & Abdomen: Peacock hurl
Legs: Small white or black rubber
Hackle: Black, dry fly quality

Tying Sequence




Attach the thread behind the eye and lay a base for the post. Form the post by doubling the poly over the thread and securing it tightly. Spiral to the center of the hook and attach the tail and wrap to the bend of the hook. Attach the wire and three sections of Peacock hurl and spiral the thread to the post and secure with the eye.

Figure 2

Form the body by wrapping the Peacock hurl forward with two turns in front thread. Wrapping in the opposite direction bring the wire forward and secure. Spiral the thread to behind the post and attach the rubber legs in an X pattern.

Figure 3

Attach the hackle to the post and wrap it parachute style and tie it off behind the eye of the hook. Whip finish, trim the post, and apply cement.

Federation of Fly Fishers honors local angler, Jayne Ferrante, with Conservation Award.

Loveland, CO – The Fresno Fly Fishers for Conservation and Kaweah Fly Fishers make a regular habit of doing projects that benefit fisheries, but one member has stood out for her efforts on a recent habitat improvement project. Fresno Fly Fishers member, Jayne Ferrante, has been the driving force in a successful stream meadow restoration project in the Sequoia National Forest in California. Ferrante was recently honored with the Conservation Award from the Federation of Fly Fishers.

“On the ground habitat restoration work is an important part of fisheries conservation,” says Leah Elwell Conservation Coordinator with the Federation of Fly Fishers “and Jayne has done an outstanding job on this project”.

Ferrante was recognized at the Federation of Fly Fishers 44th International Fly Fishing Show and Conclave held in Loveland, CO last week. The Big Meadow Improvement project utilized a restoration technique known as “pond and plug” which eliminates existing down cut channels and redirects stream flow back into a stable, historic remnant channels on the meadow surface. Ferrante was instrumental in obtaining funding to make the project possible, in assembling critical design experts, and overseeing post-project monitoring.
